

Macklin Lakeview Cemetery Project

The Macklin Lakeview Cemetery Committee has been moving forward with the cemetery improvement plan as time and funds allow. Currently the concrete pilings for the stone pillars has been installed and initial landscaping is underway. The original entrance sign leading into the cemetery will be removed shortly and sent to Kohlman's Machine & Welding for repair, expansion, and powder-coating.

The committee has decided to use the individual stone pillars as dedicated commemorative spaces available for sponsorship. There are 26 permanent stone pillars being constructed to support the wrought-iron perimeter fence. Through a donation of \$3,000 a

commemorative plaque will be inlaid within a stone pillar to forever recognize your contribution towards this project.



NEWS FROM THE FIRE HALL

Fun fact!! This is the 100th year that Fire Prevention Week has been held. It started in 1922 and has been held every year since then. The theme this year is "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape" We are already working with the teachers to bring some of the young kids from the school to come and visit us at the hall. We love having the kids come visit us every year and every year we all learn something. We talk to them and they certainly talk to us. They always have lots of questions. This year we will be talking about home escape plans. This is a very good time to talk to your family about your plan. Is there 2 ways out of every room? Do you smoke alarms and CO detectors work and or they less than 10 years old? Where do you all go in the event of a fire? When we talk to the kids at the hall they all know where they are supposed to go when the alarms go off at school, but when you ask where they go when the alarms go off at home a lot of them are not so sure. They know at school because they practice. Do you practice your escape plans at home? In the spirit of Fire prevention week let's all check our smoke detectors and practice our home escape plan. Remember "Fire Won't wait. Plan Your Escape"

Membership wise we were able to get two new recruits. Welcome to the Department Andersen Bast and Aiden Knox. We are always happy to introduce new members. We could actually use another 3 or 4 members to get our numbers up to where we would like to see them. If you have ever thought about joining or have any questions please feel free to talk to me or any other member of our department. Lots of our members have over 20 years on the department. That should tell you it is a very satisfying and rewarding way to help your community. Come out a see what we are about!!!

We would like to congratulate Terry Elder. He received his 25 years of service pin from the Provincial Government. Way to go Terry!! Rod Soderlund retired this year from our department as he is moving to another community. He will be missed at the hall and on calls. Good luck in your new town Rod.

Call wise we have responded to more calls this year, so far then we usually do. We have attended 9 motor vehicle accidents already and we have had to work on 5 fire scenes. There has been 7 false alarms which is up from last year. Counting these and some other different calls we are already at thirty calls which is slightly above our average call volume. One call that really stands out for me was a call to a field fire when it was 36C outside. We were called out just after 1 PM and were on the scene until after 7 that evening. That was a long hot day and everyone was glad to get back to the hall. I would like to thank the local area farmers who should up so quickly with water trucks and tractors with double disc. You all definitely make a huge difference that day!!!

Please remember it is still very dry out and the risk of field and grass fires is still very high. Please be careful discarding cigarettes and any burning of pits or garbage is not recommended until the snow comes.

Be safe out there everyone. Enjoy the beautiful fall colors!!

DID YOU KNOW THAT THE TOWN OF MACKLIN HAS OVER 200 DOGS REGISTERED?

With a population of about 1300 people that is a rate of 15% owning a registered dog. With so many people who love dogs and many others who don't, here is a breakdown of some responsibilities dog owners have in this community.

- All dogs within the Town of Macklin are required to obtain an annual license.
- If yard in unfenced, the dog must be kept a minimum of three (3) meters away from the public sidewalk, roadway or property line.
- The Owner of a dog shall ensure that it is not running at large.
- The Owner of a dog shall ensure the dog does not enter a school playground or sports field.
- No person shall own or shelter more than three (3) dogs, over three months of age, on any property.
- The Owner of a dog shall ensure it never defecates on public or private property.
- The Owner of a dog shall ensure their barking does NOT disturb surrounding neighbors.
- The Owner of a dog shall ensure the animal does not upset any waste receptacle and scatter the contents.
- The Owner of a dog shall ensure the animal does not bite, chase, or cause physical harm to other animals, bicycles, automobiles or human beings.
- The Owner of a dog must keep their animal always leashed when in public.

The Town of Macklin strives to ensure that dogs, their owners, and neighbors live in safety. The responsibilities and liabilities fall onto the dog owners. The Town of Macklin has an aggressive enforcement and fine protocol. If the owners of dogs neglect their responsibilities the Town of Macklin has the following Bylaw Ticket infractions to impose:





hat do the origins of Synergy Credit Union have in common with a seven-year drought and a brutal recession? The answer lies in the 1930s. In the dustbowl

of the prairies, thousands of people were losing their jobs and homes. Two dreams helped people sleep at night. One, it could rain, and two, the bank might give them a loan. Sadly, there was no rain, and the banks closed their doors.

Just when it looked hopeless, a group of tenacious individuals got together and said, "enough"! They decided to figure it out on their own - pooling their resources to care for each other. This is how they created their own financial institution, inspired by cooperative principles known as a credit union.



Before long, there was a credit union in almost every community. Previously desperate Saskatchewanians were now member-owners of a financial institution!

An idea this good had to keep going, and it did. Credit unions kept building momentum even when times got better and the banks returned. While they followed banking trends, they also blazed their own trails - such as being the first financial institution to offer payroll deduction services for deposits and loan payments.

Through the 1940s, banks were making huge profits. However, credit unions decided not to line their shareholders' pockets and instead gave the money back to their communities. By 1946, the war was over, and Saskatchewan credit unions started to literally share their profits with their members.

In the 1950s, banks became rich while, on the other hand, the credit unions kept asking what they could do for their members. By the mid-1950s, credit unions picked up the idea of credit cards and rounded out the decade by introducing Canada's first open mortgage.

In the 1960s, credit unions got their first computers, and their members could update their passbooks electronically - a big deal when it came to efficiency and accuracy.

In 1971, credit union members could drive up to the window of their credit union and do their banking! In this same decade, credit union members were able to open RRSPs.

Adding convenience in the 1980s, credit union members could use their member cards to grab cash from ATMs. Credit unions also made telephone banking a thing!

In 1993, they made it possible to pay for things in the store with your member card. By 1995,

they set the stage for online banking while still offering in-branch services to those who didn't trust the internet quite yet. As the 1990s ended, credit unions introduced Interac e-Transfer®.

In 2007, iPhones made their debut, setting the stage for mobile banking. As usual, credit unions were being innovative with ideas like chip technology and digital payments. Another big thing in 2007, we became Synergy Credit Union—ushering in a new era of memberfocused banking innovation across Saskatchewan!

Today more than ten million Canadians are members of credit unions.

So, what's next?

Like everything credit unions have done in Saskatchewan. it is about you as a member. How you manage and spend your money soon will be based on your financial data, which you will get to control and decide who can access. This emerging platform is called open

banking. Driven by digital technology and your needs, open banking will make

it even easier for you to control your money.

Much has changed since the first Saskatchewan credit union was formed in the '30s, it's just as important to look at what's stayed the same. We're with you through thick and thin, rooted in tradition and honest values, and driven by innovation

to help you reach your financial goals. This commitment to you has defined our entire story, which will never change. That's a promise. Stay tuned. It's only going to get better.
